

Statement on the public debate on migrants October 6, 2023

We are concerned about aggressive speech and fueling prejudice against migrants that is becoming more and more visible in the public debate. Sharing the concern of all fellow citizens for the security of our country, and therefore also for safe borders, we want to emphasize that every person deserves respect regardless of their citizenship, origin, skin color, religion or other individual characteristics. Guided by the message common to the three great Abrahamic religions, we believe that any stranger whose health or life are at risk must receive aid from competent government institutions. Especially one who is seeking refuge from persecution or is fleeing a war-torn country.

There are thousands of migrants of various faiths, nationalities and cultures living among us. For many, Poland has become home. They deserve respect and understanding - just like generations of Poles who sought a better, safe life for themselves and their children in Western Europe and the Americas. We consider it unacceptable to demonize migrants for political purposes. Therefore, we call on all those who are active in political life and the public debate not to instrumentalize refugees for immediate political or social purposes. Poland needs a reasonable and humane migration policy, not hatred towards strangers.
